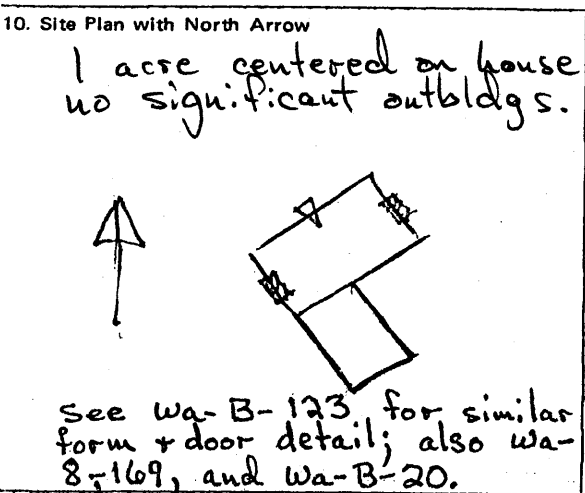

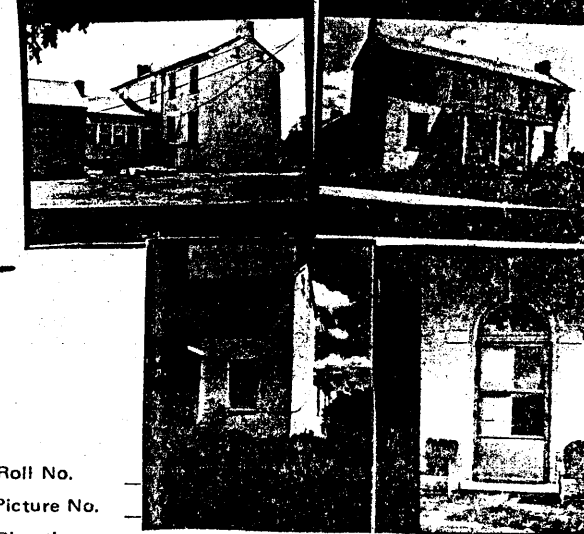

Description 2 story - 5 bay brick - front Flemish bond - jack arches - 1st floor wooden lintels and floor - fan light above door - key stone - two interior brick end chimneys - (later porch?) break in brick work between 1st and 2nd floor - 1 story original ell - American bond (sides and ell) - original basement grades - wooden sills - stone impost and door - porch in Greek Revival in stone - central passage plan -

19. History 13 panes - brick out building contemporary with house - boxed cornice with returned beneath -
Built by James Kelley - Daughter Prudence married Drillingham Thacker - lost husband and father within one week of each other - probably due to cholera epidemic of that time.
Homeplace was purchased in 1880s by R.J. Meyer and and - 1500 acres - also on the property were distilleries

20. Significance tenant houses and three brick ware houses with a spur railroad to them.
Particularly clear illustration by way of additions of changes in style.
Original owner had strong connections with early distilling industry

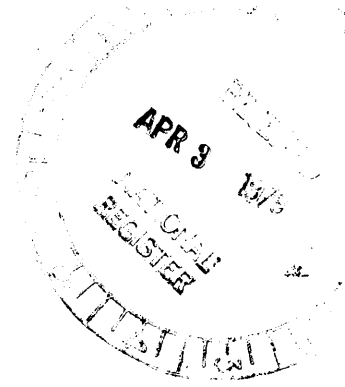

Architecture:

133. Much of the architectural significance of this house lies in the manner in which the single story Federal style structure was transformed into a Greek Revival I-house by the addition of a second floor and an entry portico on stone piers. The original form and arched door heading are similar to those of a house in Bowling Green (see Wa-B-123). The owner of the house in the late nineteenth century operated his distilling company from the farm.
