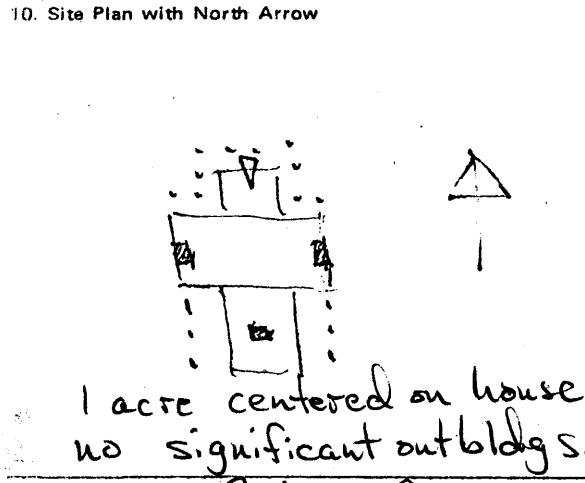

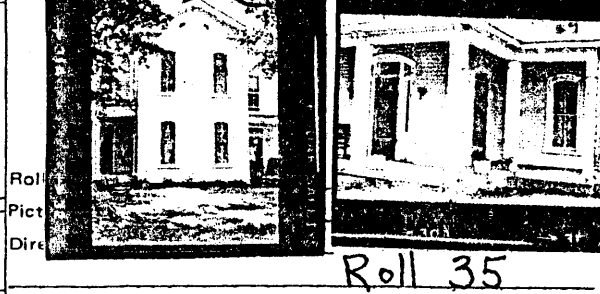

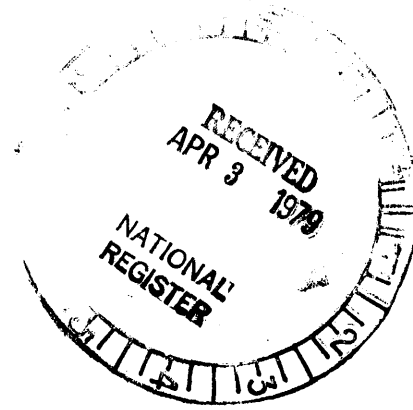

Architecture and transportation:

163. One of the few Italianate structures in Warren County, this house is as well one of the few exhibiting this particular form of T-plan or cross-gable plan (see Wa-165). The house is essentially intact. The original owner was part owner and officer in the Green and Barren River Navigation Company.
